PROGRAM NOTES

Born in 1882 near Melbourne, Australia, Percy Aldridge Grainger moved to Frankfurt at the age of 13 and lived in London from 1901–1914 where he developed an interest in folk music. It was during this period that he wrote *Marching Tune*. Based on a Lincolnshire folk song, it was written in 1905–1906 and originally scored for chorus and brass ensemble or piano.

NOTES TO THE CONDUCTOR

Marching Tune is an excellent tool to teach ensemble phrasing to your young or beginning students. The phrases are each separated by breath marks. The four-measure (and one five-measure) phrases should be attainable for most because the music is set at a medium tempo rather than a slow or moderately slow one. Encourage your students to breathe deeply to avoid breathing in the middle of each phrase.
